Dear Senate Youth Program Alumni:

Slightly more than 4200 individuals can call themselves U.S. Senate Youth Program alumni. Most likely, you can still recall the excitement and motivation of your week in Washington, D.C. So much happened so fast and then it was over. And yet, beyond your photos and mementos, think about the intangible value of the unique experience to your life and career. Wouldn't it be worthwhile to keep in touch with your fellow alumni and contribute to continuing development of another generation?

Five years ago, a group of U.S. Senate Youth Program alumni met at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D.C., to establish an association. The late Mrs. George Randolph "Mom" Hearst, Sr., encouraged the group to formalize the national network that she had fostered through an annual holiday newsletter. Realizing that "Mom" Hearst quietly supported the educational pursuits of a small number of needy alumni, the group committed themselves to establishing the Rosalie Wynn and George Randolph Hearst, Sr., Alumni Scholarship.

Today, the United States Senate Youth Alumni Association (USSYAA) continues to produce the popular holiday newsletter, which is mailed to over 1700 alumni and friends. In addition, USSYAA sponsors an annual Alumni Weekend, which coincides with the start of the U.S. Senate Youth Program. For the past two years, The William Randolph Hearst Foundations have invited alumni to staff "mentoring tables" for the purpose of sharing educational and career advice with the newest class of delegates. Attendance at Alumni Weekend has increased each year.

In order to involve more alumni in the association, the board of directors recently appointed five regional directors who are developing communication networks to benefit alumni in their search for internships and employment opportunities. In addition, the regional directors are coordinating a volunteer program through which alumni promote the U.S. Senate Youth Program in local high schools. This pilot program is being tested under the supervision of the Hearst Foundations.

During the most recent Alumni Weekend, Connie Britner (MI '66), newly appointed programs director, awarded a \$500 alumni scholarship to Jessica White Briggs (CO '93) on behalf of USSYAA. Jessica, a physician assistant, plans to work in one of the rural communities near Boise, Idaho. She will provide high quality healthcare to areas that are under served. The alumni scholarship is presented to a graduate student, preferably one in advanced standing, who is completing a first degree. Priority is given to alumni whose career goals do not indicate a high potential for earnings to defray accumulated debt.

Exciting plans lie ahead for USSYAA; however, your financial support is needed. The cost of producing and mailing the 2003 holiday newsletter totaled \$2,100—a mere \$1.24 per addressee. Each year, 104 new alumni are added to the mailing list. Although alumni are donating legal services, administrative support, and logistical assistance, our ability to serve the needs of alumni is limited by our financial resources.

With your help, we will continue "Mom" Hearst's legacy of supporting deserving alumni through financial aid scholarships. Beginning this year, please consider adding USSYAA to your annual giving plans as we continue to strengthen our unique organization. Any amount will help, whether \$5 or \$500. From the President's Desk

March 2004 will mark the Sixth Anniversary of the United States Senate Youth Alumni Association (USSYAA). As you have heard many times, USSYAA carries on the decades-long work of Ms. Rosalie Wynn Hearst – “Mom Hearst” as Senate Youth delegates called her and “Mrs. George Randolph Hearst, Sr.” as she preferred to be called on formal occasions.

About six years ago from my office at Two World Trade Center in Manhattan, I asked, begged, and finally told an ailing Mom Hearst not to depart this world before she was honored during our First Annual Alumni Dinner and Outstanding Service Award Program. She promised to stick around at least until the USSYAA was organized. Such an alumni organization was her fondest wish. In her role as Mother to thousands of Senate Youth delegates, she wanted an alumni group to become a perpetual Family for future delegates.

The clock was ticking. During 1997-98, Wendy Jo Peterson (WA, 1978) and I organized the Association. There were bylaws to draft and forms to file. As fast as we could, we obtained approvals and registrations from the United States Patent and Trademark Office, the Internal Revenue Service, and the District of Columbia Government. All of that paper work emanated from the World Trade Center.

Although Mrs. Hearst was irreplaceable, we developed an organization with her Mission at its core: To promote the welfare of the United States Senate Youth Program and its delegates by fostering a spirit of loyalty, commitment, and service among Program alumni. This Mission – her Mission – has three pillars:

1. Building and maintaining avenues of communication among Program alumni;
2. Providing financial assistance for professional educational needs of Program alumni; and
3. Supporting the Senate Youth Program when called upon to do so by Program officials.

Devotion to Mom Hearst and appreciation of this Mission have turned the USSYAA into a smashing success. With the historical wit and wisdom of both Ms. Gladys S. Hundley, USSYAA's Special Advisor, and Mr. James T. Molloy, our Executive Director, we are meeting our Mission and fulfilling Mom Hearst's dream.

Mrs. Hearst kept her promise. The First Annual Alumni Dinner and Outstanding Service Awards Program was held on March 7, 1999 at the Mayflower Hotel. It was Mom Hearst's birthday, and she was there to enjoy the program, entitled “A Tribute to ‘Mom,’ Mrs. George Randolph Hearst, Sr.” It was her last birthday with us.

As I pass the torch to Mr. Robert Middleton (DC, 1966), President-Elect of the USSYAA, this is a very emotional period for me. I keep reminding myself, Everything Has Its Time: Beginnings and Endings, Endings and Beginnings. As Ecclesiastes, Chapter 3:1 states, “To everything there is a season, a time for every purpose under heaven.” In my life, this includes Senate Youth, Mom Hearst, the World Trade Center, and the USSYAA presidency.

Before Mom Hearst passed away, she physically kissed into my spirit her Holy intangibles: a spirit of desire and dreams, a gingerly touch of compassion, and an inexhaustible benevolent love of humanity. With my total support and best wishes, I pass Rosalie Wynn Hearst's Holy intangibles to our new USSYAA President, Bob Middleton.

Alumni Dinner 2004 to be held, Friday, February 27th, at Residence of Michael S. Sundermeyer

On Friday, February 27, 2004, the 2004 Annual Alumni Dinner for the United States Senate Youth Alumni Association will be held at the home of Michael S. Sundermeyer (MO, 1969), 3928 Livingston Street, NW, Washington, DC. Tickets for the event are \$60.00 per person with a special student rate of \$25.00 per person. Michael, who serves on the Board of Directors as the Association's Liaison Officer with the United States Senate Youth Program, as well as with the William Randolph Hearst Foundations, is opening his home for a catered buffet dinner. For the second year in a row, he and his wife Susan Talarico look forward to welcoming alums beginning at 7:30 p.m. Below are directions to the Sundermeyer home:

DIRECTIONS:

METRO: We are about three blocks from the Friendship Heights Metro Station on the Red Line. Take the Western Avenue exit out of the station. This exit is at the north end of the station. The escalator emerges at the corner of Western, Wisconsin Avenue, and Military Road. Once on Western Avenue, walk east (toward Connecticut Avenue). As you walk up Western Avenue to the east, Livingston Street will appear on the right. Livingston is the first street on the right after the big intersection of Western, Wisconsin, and Military. Turn right on Livingston and walk about 2.5 blocks. 3928 is on the right.

BY CAR FROM DOWNTOWN: Take Connecticut Avenue north about 5-6 miles. Take a left on Livingston. There is a Starbucks at the corner. Go up a block and a half to 3928 (on the left). If you get to Chevy Chase Circle, you have gone too far.

BY TAXI (or CAR) FROM NATIONAL AIRPORT: Tell the taxi driver you are going to upper Northwest in D.C. near 39th and Livingston. Tell him or her to take the Memorial Bridge to Rock Creek Parkway; to Massachusetts Avenue. Take a left on Massachusetts Avenue. Take a right on 34th Street, which is at the Vice President's house. Continue on 34th Street which will turn into Reno Road. Tell the driver to take Reno Road all the way north past Military Road (about 3 miles). After you pass Military Road, take a right on Livingston Street, which is the next stoplight after Military. Number 3928 is down a half block on the rights.

BY CAR FROM THE NORTH INCLUDING THE BELTWAY: Take Connecticut Avenue south from the Beltway. Go around Chevy Chase Circle and continue south on Connecticut. After the circle, go about four blocks further south on Connecticut to Livingston Street. There is a Starbucks at the corner. Turn right on Livingston. Go a block and a half to 3928 (on the left).

BY CAR FROM NORTHERN VIRGINIA: Take the Beltway west to River Road exit. Take River Road toward D.C. Turn left on Western Avenue. Take Western Avenue past Wisconsin Avenue. Continue on Western Avenue another long block to Livingston. Take a right on Livingston. Go down 2.5 blocks to 3928 on the right.

2004 Annual Meeting to be held Saturday, February 28th, at Williams and Connolly

As of October 1, 2003, USSYA had revenues of \$69,844 and expenses of \$34,550 providing a balance of \$35,295. These figures are cumulative since the inception of the organization and are not annualized.

Thomas Eastham Receives 2003 Alumni Service Award

For the past four years, USSYAA has presented an annual service award to individuals who have made significant contributions to the U.S. Senate Youth Program or the alumni association. On March 1, 2003, USSYAA president-elect Robert Middleton (DC, 1966) presented the award to Thomas Eastham, vice president and western director of The William Randolph Hearst Foundations. For the first time, the presentation took place at the Mayflower Hotel before current delegates, foundation officials, and program alumni. Middleton paid tribute to Eastham's 15 years of dedicated service to the program. The award consists of an engraved plaque, which bears a color likeness of the United States flag.

Prior to joining the Hearst Foundations, Eastham served as director of public information and press secretary to the mayor of San Francisco. He enjoyed a long and distinguished career as a journalist. For 17 years, Eastham served as executive editor, then D.C. bureau chief for the *San Francisco Examiner*. As a writer for the *Chicago American*, he received a Pulitzer Prize nomination.

Today, Eastham is an active member of a number of local and national organizations. He holds membership in the National Trust for Historic Preservation; President's Roundtable, University of San Francisco; American Society of Newspaper Editors; White House Correspondents Association; National Press Club; Council on Foundations, and Sigma Delta Chi. He is a 1952 graduate of Northwestern University. Eastham and his wife, Margaret, are the parents of two sons, Scott Thomas and Todd Robert.

Past recipients of USSYAA's service award include: Mrs. George Randolph Hearst, Sr.; Mrs. Gladys Hundley; Dr. Roy McKeown, Millicent Hearst Boudjadjdji and Mr. James T. Molloy.

Nathan J. A. Humphrey (CA, 1980) resigned as Director of Alumni Programs due to his increased responsibilities as a newly ordained Episcopal priest. The board appointed Brandon J. Lucas (CA, 1988), formerly Western Regional Director, to serve as Central Regional Director and appointed Mehul J. Patel (NJ, 1994) to serve as Western Regional Director.

Alumni Invited to Increase Awareness of U.S. Senate Youth Program

Last Spring, USSYAA continued to develop a communication project in which alumni helped promote the Senate Youth Program in America's high schools. Coordinated by Leah McLean of the Hearst Foundations, the project involved communication by alumni with high school administrators and students to introduce them to the Program or, in many cases, to remind them of the wonderful opportunities that the Program offers.

During the 2004 USSYAA Annual Meeting, we'll review the project and, assuming that the Hearst Foundations would like our assistance again, begin recruiting participants for promotional activity in the late spring, summer, and early fall of 2004. Most States choose delegates in September and October.

New Alumni Programs Being Considered

When Nathan Humphrey stepped down as Director of Alumni Programs on March 1, 2003, he and his committee members had, through the award of our first \$500 Rosalie Wynn and George Randolph Hearst, Sr. Scholarship to Ms. Jessica Briggs, (CO, 1993), successfully addressed item #2 of the USSYAA mission statement: “providing assistance for professional educational needs of program alumni.” New director Connie Britner looks to continue the scholarship process already in motion and to begin addressing item #1 of the mission statement: “building and maintaining avenues of communication among program alumni.”

Current interests and requests revolved around creation of an Internship Network. For example, in early April, Hannah Sager (FL, 2001) sent an internship inquiry about the fields of advertising, publishing, marketing and communications. Perhaps we can give some thought to initially creating a network related to the fields represented at the mentoring tables? Step one would probably be creation of a roster of those willing to provide internships or who would be willing to make contacts for internships. Our annual newsletter and our website might serve as a means to creating the roster. At least annual contact should then be made to maintain an effective network roster. Step two, at the mentor tables we might collect information from Alum and delegates regarding internship placements and internship interest. Any thoughts?

A second possibility might be an alumni travel/host network as a way to “maintain avenues of communication” and provide alumni a showcase opportunity to share their own local home sites of interest. The first step would seem to be determining potential hosts. The annual meeting might be a way to accomplish this, and the Friday alumni dinner.

An extended mentorship might be another means for maintaining communication. Firsthand career experiences might be shared. It might be an e-mail pals network for information and contact. This could all be established informally at the time of the mentoring tables (and may already be happening to some extent).

USSYAA Seeks Donations to and Applications for the Rosalie Wynn and George Randolph Hearst Sr. Scholarship Fund

Grants of up to \$500 are made available to deserving alumni to defray the costs of graduate and professional programs. Priority is given to those alumni pursuing careers in which earnings may not adequately reflect the individual’s level of commitment and service to society. The application deadline for the next round of scholarships is September 15, 2004.

CLASS OF 1970
